



THE LESSONS

First Lesson: Wisdom of Solomon 1:13-15; 2:23-24

Lector The Lord answered Job out of the whirlwind:

God did not make death,

And he does not delight in the death of the living. For he created all things so that they might exist; the generative forces of the world are wholesome, and there is no destructive poison in them, and the dominion of Hades is not on earth.

For righteousness is immortal.

God created us for incorruption,

and made us in the image of his own eternity,

but through the devil's envy death entered the world, and those who belong to his company experience it.

Second Lesson: 2 Corinthians 8:7-15

Lector

As you excel in everything—in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in utmost eagerness, and in our love for you—so we want you to excel also in this generous undertaking.

I do not say this as a command, but I am testing the genuineness of your love against the earnestness of others. For you know the generous act of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, so that by his poverty you might become rich. And in this matter I am giving my advice: it is appropriate for you who began last year not only to do something but even to desire to do something—now finish doing it, so that your eagerness may be matched by completing it according to your means. For if the eagerness is there, the gift is acceptable according to what one has—not according to what one does not have. I do not mean that there should be relief for others and pressure on you, but it is a question of a fair balance between your present abundance and their need, so that their abundance may be for your need, in order that there may be a fair balance. As it is written,

"The one who had much did not have too much, and the one who had little did not have too little."

When Jesus had crossed again in the boat to the other side, a great crowd gathered around him; and he was by the sea. Then one of the leaders of the synagogue named Jairus came and, when he saw him, fell at his feet and begged him repeatedly, "My little daughter is at the point of death. Come and lay your hands on her, so that she may be made well, and live." So he went with him.

And a large crowd followed him and pressed in on him. Now there was a woman who had been suffering from hemorrhages for twelve years. She had endured much under many physicians, and had spent all that she had; and she was no better, but rather grew worse. She had heard about Jesus, and came up behind him in the crowd and touched his cloak, for she said, "If I but touch his clothes, I will be made well." Immediately her hemorrhage stopped; and she felt in her body that she was healed of her disease. Immediately aware that power had gone forth from him, Jesus turned about in the crowd and said, "Who touched my clothes?" And his disciples said to him, "You see the crowd pressing in on you; how can you say, 'Who touched me?" He looked all around to see who had done it. But the woman, knowing what had happened to her, came in fear and trembling, fell down before him, and told him the whole truth. He said to her, "Daughter, your faith has made you well; go in peace, and be healed of your disease."

While he was still speaking, some people came from the leader's house to say, "Your daughter is dead. Why trouble the teacher any further?" But overhearing what they said, Jesus said to the leader of the synagogue, "Do not fear, only believe." He allowed no one to follow him except Peter, James, and John, the brother of James. When they came to the house of the leader of the synagogue, he saw a commotion, people weeping and wailing loudly. When he had entered, he said to them, "Why do you make a commotion and weep? The child is not dead but sleeping." And they laughed at him. Then he put them all outside, and took the child's father and mother and those who were with him, and went in where the child was. He took her by the hand and said to her, "Talitha cum," which means, "Little girl, get up!" And immediately the girl got up and began to walk about (she was twelve years of age). At this they were overcome with amazement. He strictly ordered them that no one should know this, and told them to give her something to eat.





Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination: "Let Us Lie in Wait" (Wisdom of Solomon 1:16-2:24)

While the Wisdom of Solomon (listed among the Old Testament Apocryphal books) has not been given major attention during most of Christian history, some biblical scholars today think it played a role in the formation of New Testament theology. Among concepts found in the book are a prefiguration of the passion narrative, a preexistent Christ, and a complex set of images contemplating God as Creator, Savior, and Provider (a Trinitarian theology). These convictions inform portions of today's illumination.

The Wisdom of Solomon addresses the same concerns as the Book of Ecclesiastes but does so from the perspective of those who "reasoned unsoundly" rather than that of the "wise person." Instead of enjoying life as a gift from God which Ecclesiastes teaches, the ungodly in the Wisdom of Solomon reason that since life on earth is all there is they should live for pleasure. Based on this thinking they oppress the righteous, allowing "might [to] be our law of right."

This reverse perspective from Ecclesiastes is reflected in today's illumination through use of the backward text: "Let us lie in wait for the righteous man" (2:12). This "colorless" illumination suggests that the ungodly live in a darkened world and do not see God nor God's activity in creation. They bring chaos and violence into the world and are without wisdom.

The words of Wisdom 2:22-23 frame this illumination pointing out the error of those who ignore God: "They did not know the secret purposes of God ... for God created us for incorruption, and made us in the image of his own eternity." Christ's passion, paradoxically, achieved God's "secret purposes."

In contemporary life do you find examples of the Wisdom of Solomon's descriptions of those who pursue folly instead of wisdom? Does the chaos and violence of the world ever tempt you to adopt this reasoning yourself? What influences you to not embrace this philosophy of life? You might try reading the Wisdom of Solomon (18 brief chapters) and see what encouragement you find for living according to "God's secret purposes."

The Philadelphia Eleven

In a defiant act, after two General Conventions failed to authorize the ordination of women as priests, three retired bishops (including West Missouri's Edward R. Welles II) ordained eleven women (including Welles's daughter, Katrina) as priests in The Episcopal Church. The event took place July 29, 1974, at Philadelphia's Episcopal Church of the Advocate, and these brave women — demeaned, threatened, and initially rejected — became known as the Philadelphia Eleven.
