THE LESSONS

First Lesson: Jeremiah 23:1-6

Lector Woe to the shepherds who destroy and scatter the sheep of my pasture! says the Lord. Therefore thus says the Lord, the God of Israel, concerning the shepherds who shepherd my people: It is you who have scattered my flock, and have driven them away, and you have not attended to them. So I will attend to you for your evil doings, says the Lord. Then I myself will gather the remnant of my flock out of all the lands where I have driven them, and I will bring them back to their fold, and they shall be fruitful and multiply. I will raise up shepherds over them who will shepherd them, and they shall not fear any longer, or be dismayed, nor shall any be missing, says the Lord.

The days are surely coming, says the Lord, when I will raise up for David a righteous Branch, and he shall reign as king and deal wisely, and shall execute justice and righteousness in the land. In his days Judah will be saved and Israel will live in safety. And this is the name by which he will be called: "The Lord is our righteousness."

Second Lesson: Ephesians 2:11-22

Lector Remember that at one time you Gentiles by birth, called “the uncircumcision” by those who are called “the circumcision” —a physical circumcision made in the flesh by human hands— remember that you were at that time without Christ, being aliens from the commonwealth of Israel, and strangers to the covenants of promise, having no hope and without God in the world. But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far off have been brought near by the blood of Christ. For he is our peace; in his flesh he has made both groups into one and has broken down the dividing wall, that is, the hostility between us. He has abolished the law with its commandments and ordinances, that he might create in himself one new humanity in place of the two, thus making peace, and might reconcile both groups to God in one body through the cross, thus putting to death that hostility through it. So he came and proclaimed peace to you who were far off and peace to those who were near; for through him both of us have access in one Spirit to the Father. So then you are no longer strangers and aliens, but you are citizens with the saints and also members of the household of God, built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as the cornerstone. In him the whole structure is joined together and grows into a holy temple in the Lord; in whom you also are built together spiritually into a dwelling place for God.

* THE HOLY GOSPEL: Mark 6:30-34, 53-56

Gospeller The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.

Gospeller The apostles gathered around Jesus, and told him all that they had done and taught. He said to them, “Come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest a while.” For many were coming and going, and they had no leisure even to eat. And they went away in the boat to a deserted place by themselves. Now many saw them going and recognized them, and they hurried there on foot from all the towns and arrived ahead of them. As he went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd; and he began to teach them many things.

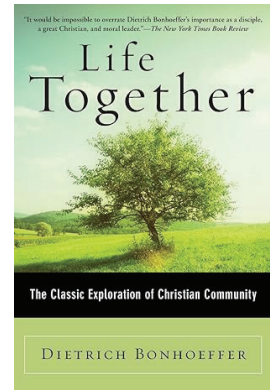

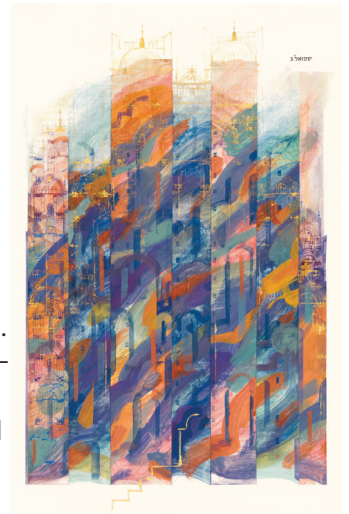
Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination: "David Anthology" (1 Samuel 16 through 2 Samuel 24)

Lacking artwork in the Saint John's Bible for today's Old Testament-track 2, Epistle, and Gospel text readings, we turn to the Revised Common Lectionary text of the Old Testament-track 1 to obtain our Visio Divina focus. This text is located within a more expansive scriptural passage that is portrayed in an illumination titled "David Anthology". The common theological thread uniting these texts might be identified as "one new humanity" in which all people (Jew and Gentile) are united as one in God's redemptive plan. God's promise to David occupies a central position in this plan.

In 2 Samuel 7:1-14a, King David from his palatial "house" proposes to build a "house" (temple) for God. Instead, God promises to build a "house" (dynasty) for David. This promise is repeated in Psalm 89:28-29. Later, New Testament writers go to great lengths to connect this Davidic promise with Jesus, fulfilling the promise of David's eternal kingdom. Thus, David's reign is considered to be foundational for God's new united humanity, a reason why an illumination portraying his reign was deemed important to the Saint John's Bible planning committee.

The illuminator faced a formidable challenge regarding how to depict this shepherd, giant slayer, warrior, psalmist, king, champion of the ark of the covenant, and agent of God's everlasting kingdom in a single illumination. Donald Jackson decided that the best way to accomplish this would be through depicting the entire David narrative by means of a vision of Israel that was derived from the period of David's reign and centering this account within the larger story visually portrayed throughout Saint John's Bible. Consequently, the "David Anthology" includes elements connecting it to many other illuminations in this Bible. The seven panels of the anthology are reminiscent of the Genesis "Creation" illumination, suggesting that David's kingship is important for the restitution of God's reign on earth. The golden stamped archways are reminiscent of the spires of the Cathedral of Santiago de Compostela, suggesting that people seek God in sacred spaces and David is a significant representation of this longing for God. The "Frontispiece of the Psalms", also connected with this anthology, is a reminder of the hymns attributed to David and the deep association the Psalms have with the David story. The seven-branched Menorah connects the anthology with the "Abraham and Sarah" illumination in Genesis and the "Genealogy of Jesus" illumination in Matthew. Thus, the covenant story continues from Abraham to David and then to Jesus. Throughout the "David Anthology" we find symbols of the Ark of the Covenant. Each image serves as a reminder of the sacred spaces important in Israel's pilgrimage with God.

How does David's story help your reflection on your own experiences of encounter with God in sacred spaces. What are those spaces like for you?

In a defiant act, after two General Conventions failed to authorize the ordination of women as priests, three retired bishops (including West Missouri's Edward R. Welles II) ordained eleven women (including Welles' daughter, Katrina) as priests in The Episcopal Church. The event took place July 29, 1974, at Philadelphia's Episcopal Church of the Advocate, and these brave women — demeaned, threatened, and initially rejected — became known as the Philadelphia Eleven.
