

Gospeller The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

Gospeller

Jesus went to the other side of the Sea of Galilee, also called the Sea of Tiberias. A large crowd kept following him, because they saw the signs that he was doing for the sick. Jesus went up the mountain and sat down there with his disciples. Now the Passover, the festival of the Jews, was near. When he looked up and saw a large crowd coming toward him, Jesus said to Philip, "Where are we to buy bread for these people to eat?" He said this to test him, for he himself knew what he was going to do. Philip answered him, "Six months' wages would not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little." One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, "There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?" Jesus said, "Make the people sit down." Now there was a great deal of grass in the place; so they sat down, about five thousand in all. Then Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted. When they were satisfied, he told his disciples, "Gather up the fragments left over, so that nothing may be lost." So they gathered them up, and from the fragments of the five barley loaves, left by those who had eaten, they filled twelve baskets. When the people saw the sign that he had done, they began to say, "This is indeed the prophet who is to come into the world."

When Jesus realized that they were about to come and take him by force to make him king, he withdrew again to the mountain by himself.

When evening came, his disciples went down to the sea, got into a boat, and started across the sea to Capernaum. It was now dark, and Jesus had not yet come to them. The sea became rough because a strong wind was blowing. When they had rowed about three or four miles, they saw Jesus walking on the sea and coming near the boat, and they were terrified. But he said to them, "It is I; do not be afraid." Then they wanted to take him into the boat, and immediately the boat reached the land toward which they were going.



Presiding Bishop-elect Rowe's Installation Service

As announced at the close of the 81st General Convention, the installation of Presiding Bishop-elect Sean Rowe will be a simpler, scaled-down event this fall with a view toward reducing carbon footprint and increasing virtual engagement and participation.

The installation service will take place **on Nov. 2** at the Chapel of Christ the Lord in The Episcopal Church Center in New York City with a prelude beginning at 10 a.m. ET and the **service starting at 11 a.m. ET**. There will be an extensive livestream production to support churchwide access and participation.

All are welcome and encouraged to attend virtually—and dioceses should begin thinking about organizing watch parties. The Episcopal Church Office of Communication will be supporting those efforts with customizable invitations and other assets, with more information available in the coming months.

The Rt. Rev. Deon Johnson, bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri and chair of the installation planning committee, said: "I am delighted to work with Presiding Bishop-elect Rowe and the committee in planning this historic installation. Having planned and experienced a scaled-down consecration myself during COVID, I am very familiar with the challenges and opportunities this presents.



"As a planning committee, we are committed to centering the rich diversity of our church and providing increased opportunities for virtual engagement to our community and beyond."



Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination: "Loaves and Fishes" (Mark 6:33-44)

Saint John's Bible does not have an illumination dedicated specifically to John 6:1-21, but it does include a stunning illumination for the parallel Markian accounts. Mark actually includes two Loaves and Fishes narratives (6:33-44 and 8: 1-10). Today's illumination is based on a frequent interpretation of this narrative which understands it as the expansion of Jesus' salvation message to include

both Jews and Gentiles. The subtle color shifts portray the movement from the twelve tribes of Israel (on the left) to the Gentiles (on the right). Both became recipients of God's abundant, life-giving provision.

The fish and bread are highlighted in this portrayal, and the bread (featured in gold and marked with crosses) is intended to connect it with the eucharistic meal. Scattered about the page are thin brown bars indicating an abundance of bread and scale-like features suggesting ample pieces of fish. The arrangement of these elements was inspired by a Byzantine mosaic at Tabgha, a pilgrimage site located on the Sea of Galilee which memorializes the first-century miracle of the loaves and fishes.

The illumination also features basket designs derived from Native American Ancestral Puebloan (sometimes referred to as Anasazi) basketry intended to convey the exponential multiplication embodied in this miracle and its connection to "sacred geometry." In this way,



illuminator Donald Jackson seeks to expand the miracle's application beyond food alone to include the way exponential acts of love, sharing, or charity also should spill over into the larger human community. Images of the illumination flow around the page like the geometrically expanding flow of love and acts of kindness once they have been given birth.

The heavier blue bars scattered about the page suggest obstacles to the flow of love and acts of kindness which are symbolic of sins of commission. The blank spaces that divide the illumination into sections represent sins of omission. The Aramaic word in the right margin highlighted with the small red diamond draws attention to Mark 7:11's reference to Corban, a pharisaic practice criticized by Jesus for valuing public displays of piety above God's intended authentic sharing.

What images of abundance and transformation can you identify in this illumination? How would you describe the interaction of the human and divine that is portrayed here? How might the truth expressed here be applied to the lifestyles of our world today?


Open House at Pete's Garden Sunday, August 25 • morning coffee hours
