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



First Lesson: Jeremiah 11:18-20

Lector

Who is wise and understanding among you? Show by your good life that your works are done with gentleness born of wisdom. But if you have bitter envy and selfish ambition in your hearts, do not be boastful and false to the truth. Such wisdom does not come down from above, but is earthly, unspiritual, devilish. For where there is envy and selfish ambition, there will also be disorder and wickedness of every kind. But the wisdom from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, willing to yield, full of mercy and good fruits, without a trace of partiality or hypocrisy. And a harvest of righteousness is sown in peace for those who make peace.

Those conflicts and disputes among you, where do they come from? Do they not come from your cravings that are at war within you? You want something and do not have it; so you commit murder. And you covet something and cannot obtain it; so you engage in disputes and conflicts. You do not have, because you do not ask. You ask and do not receive, because you ask wrongly, in order to spend what you get on your pleasures.

Submit yourselves therefore to God. Resist the devil, and he will flee from you. Draw near to God, and he will draw near to you.





All Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.



Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination: "Hymn to a Virtuous Woman" (Proverbs 31:1-31)

The concluding hymn of the Book of Proverbs is possibly a description of Wisdom herself. Closing out this book's imaginary parents' instructions, the mother advises her son on the kind of person he should marry.

Today's illumination depicts a sewing sampler reminiscent of those which have often been used to decorate homes over the decades. Among other things, it is used here to emphasize the importance of women in ethical instruction. The sampler's images convey domestic themes – water jugs, gardens, food producing plants, quilt patterns, and similar items. The illuminator's intent is to emphasize God's domestic qualities, reminding the viewer that God is nurturing and cares deeply about the needs of family and home. We find God's presence in the domestic virtues of order, creation, caring, and related qualities.

Illuminator Hazel Dolby extends the illumination into the margins of these pages through independent images of a flower, a vase, and a bee busily filling a honeycomb. Note also the tassels on the bottom of the sampler. They are reminiscent of the tassels on a Jewish prayer shawl designed to remind the user of the importance of being faithful in prayer and in reflecting on God's blessings. Wisdom nurtures development of a relationship with God in addition to her many domestic and professional qualities as highlighted here.

Ponder the attributes you value in persons with whom you form close relationships. Viewing the "virtuous woman" as Wisdom personified, how do her qualities align with those of your admired associates? Try imagining that you are the mother in this text writing in praise of the virtues of a person you greatly admire. What qualities would you highlight? What images would you select to help communicate those qualities?

Christian Discussions about When Personhood Begins

Wednesdays, Sept. 18, 25, Oct. 2, 9 6:30-7:45 p.m.

Dr. Gary Armstrong, Professor of Political Science at William Jewell College

The question of when we should say human personhood begins has long been important. We have seen startling technical changes in assisted human reproduction. We are all hearing important discussions about crucial legal changes since the end of Roe v. Wade. Missouri may vote on a constitutional amendment in November. This course will survey some important contemporary Christian thinking about personhood. It will use some of the same discussions from Gary Armstrong's Core Curriculum Capstone "Birth By Any Means? The Ethics of Assisted Reproductive Technology" at Jewell. We will explore a seminal analysis from a Roman Catholic theologian who thinks we cannot say personhood begins at conception for scientific and theological reasons and examine an important response. We will follow a Protestant theologian wrestling with classic Scripture passages that bear on abortion while trying to develop a standard about whether Christians can ever cooperate in good conscience with abortion; we will consider applying the same standard to genetic screening of early embryos.
