THE LESSONS

First Lesson: Genesis 2:18-24

Lector

The Lord God said, "It is not good that the man should be alone; I will make him a helper as his partner." So out of the ground the Lord God formed every animal of the field and every bird of the air, and brought them to the man to see what he would call them; and whatever the man called every living creature, that was its name. The man gave names to all cattle, and to the birds of the air, and to every animal of the field; but for the man there was not found a helper as his partner. So the Lord God caused a deep sleep to fall upon the man, and he slept; then he took one of his ribs and closed up its place with flesh. And the rib that the Lord God had taken from the man he made into a woman and brought her to the man. Then the man said,

"This at last is bone of my bones and flesh of my flesh; this one shall be called Woman, for out of Man this one was taken."

Therefore a man leaves his father and his mother and clings to his wife, and they become one flesh.

Second Lesson: Hebrews 1:1-4; 2:5-12

Lector

Long ago God spoke to our ancestors in many and various ways by the prophets, but in these last days he has spoken to us by a Son, whom he appointed heir of all things, through whom he also created the worlds. He is the reflection of God's glory and the exact imprint of God's very being, and he sustains all things by his powerful word. When he had made purification for sins, he sat down at the right hand of the Majesty on high, having become as much superior to angels as the name he has inherited is more excellent than theirs.

Now God did not subject the coming world, about which we are speaking, to angels. But someone has testified somewhere,

"What are human beings that you are mindful of them,

or mortals, that you care for them?

You have made them for a little while lower than the angels;

you have crowned them with glory and honor,

subjecting all things under their feet."

Now in subjecting all things to them, God left nothing outside their control. As it is, we do not yet see everything in subjection to them, but we do see Jesus, who for a little while was made lower than the angels, now crowned with glory and honor because of the suffering of death, so that by the grace of God he might taste death for everyone.

It was fitting that God, for whom and through whom all things exist, in bringing many children to glory, should make the pioneer of their salvation perfect through sufferings. For the one who sanctifies and those who are sanctified all have one Father. For this reason Jesus is not ashamed to call them brothers and sisters, saying,

"I will proclaim your name to my brothers and sisters, in the midst of the congregation I will praise you."



Some Pharisees came, and to test Jesus they asked, "Is it lawful for a man to divorce his wife?" He answered them, "What did Moses command you?" They said, "Moses allowed a man to write a certificate of dismissal and to divorce her." But Jesus said to them, "Because of your hardness of heart he wrote this commandment for you. But from the beginning of creation, 'God made them male and female.' 'For this reason a man shall leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and the two shall become one flesh.' So they are no longer two, but one flesh. Therefore what God has joined together, let no one separate."

Then in the house the disciples asked him again about this matter. He said to them, "Whoever divorces his wife and marries another commits adultery against her; and if she divorces her husband and marries another, she commits adultery."

People were bringing little children to him in order that he might touch them; and the disciples spoke sternly to them. But when Jesus saw this, he was indignant and said to them, "Let the little children come to me; do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of God belongs. Truly I tell you, whoever does not receive the kingdom of God as a little child will never enter it." And he took them up in his arms, laid his hands on them, and blessed them.

Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination: "Job Frontispiece" (Job 1:1)

The Book of Job opens the Wisdom Books volume of the Saint John's Bible, and the initial illumination, "Job Frontispiece", immediately confronts the reader with a sobering portrayal of life. It depicts a world in chaos. On the left side of this illumination are images of Job's wealth - cattle, donkeys, camels, and servants. The lower left includes visual indicators of fertility including birds and fish. In the upper left are found arches of buildings. The initial impression suggests that Job's world is beautiful, prosperous, and idyllic.

However, a closer examination of these same images reveals that trouble even now is at hand. Job's livestock and servants are facing away as though they already are in the process of departing from him. When we move to the center portion of the illumination, we see that things are beginning to fall apart. Fire and fractals indicative of chaos dominate. Job's wealth is being threatened. Things are looking ominous. Finally, as we reach the right-hand side, all is lost. The black and purple colors portray the decimation of Job's riches and communicate tragedy and pain. Yet, amid the chaos and loss shown in the third panel, gold bars remind lob



that God remains present. He has not been abandoned even though to all appearances this seems to be the case.

Another possibility for viewing and interpreting this illumination would be to begin at the top left and trace Job's spiritual journey through to the bottom right. At this point it is important to note that in the Wisdom Books an additional dimension of interpretation appears in the artwork. Besides the use of gold to indicate divinity, silver (actually platinum) is introduced to highlight wisdom (another way in which the divine is present). In the top left panel, silver bars along with gold ones communicate God's presence with Job. Job has a strong awareness of God's wisdom and love at work in his life and world. Progressing to the center panel, the bars become black, with less gold and silver. Job experiences an overwhelming sense that barriers stand between him and God. God seems distant and communication with him seems difficult if not impossible. However, by the time we reach the bottom right portion of the illumination, Job has gained a full measure of wisdom and again is connected with God. The abundance of gold and silver bars here indicate that Job is once more aware of God's providence andlove, perhaps with a profundity beyond that which he previously had known before tragedy struck.

As you contemplate the "Job Frontispiece" illumination, what insights does it inspire in you regarding God's presence during times of tragedy and loss? Does this in any way help you better comprehend God's nature and working?
