

Children





THE LESSONS

First Lesson: Amos 5:6-7,10-15

Lector Seek the Lord and live,

or he will break out against the house of Joseph like fire, and it will devour Bethel, with no one to quench it.



Peter began to say to him, "Look, we have left everything and followed you." Jesus said, "Truly I tell you, there is no one who has left house or brothers or sisters or mother or father or children or fields, for my sake and for the sake of the good news, who will not receive a hundredfold now in this age—houses, brothers and sisters, mothers and children, and fields with persecutions—and in the age to come eternal life. But many who are first will be last, and the last will be first."

Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination: "The Marginalia"

It was common among Medieval and Renaissance biblical manuscripts to include various types of artwork and writings on page borders. This material often personalized and localized the work. Saint John's Bible continues this tradition. Throughout the seven-volume Bible, readers will find depictions of fauna and flora from Minnesota and Welsh landscapes. In some cases, these are primarily decorative in purpose, but often they convey a message. At times the message is connected to a biblical text near the place where the marginal image is located. At other times the message is more generalized. The New Revised Standard marginal notes are also part of the marginalia.

Today's Amos 5 text includes both a marginal image and marginal notes. The image is of a locust, portrayed with dazzling beauty and gracefulness in this drawing but a source of dread and alarm to



In the ancient world locust plagues were considered among the severest evils inflicted upon humanity. Indelible impressions of their horrors are recorded in the Bible as well as other ancient documents. An example is found in Joel 1:4, where he writes: "what the cutting locust left; the swarming locust has eaten. What the swarming locust left; the hopping locust has eaten. What the hopping locust left; the destroying locust has eaten." In the Hebrew Bible (Old Testament), at least nine different words are used to identify locusts. The sheer number of descriptors is an indication of the degree of pain these creatures inflicted and the impact they had on Middle Eastern culture. The marginal image at Amos 5 conveys an incredible amount of unarticulated emotion and painful life-experience.

In prophetic literature, locust plagues were interpreted as indications of divine warning and threat of judgement. This is the case in Amos 4:9 where the prophet writes: "the locust devoured your fig trees and your olive trees, yet you did not return to me says the Lord." The marginal image of this solitary locust is a powerful symbol of nature's ability to subvert human plans, achievements, and provisions. It also could pose the question: "Where might God be found in all of this"?

Plagues of locusts and grasshoppers (like many other acts of nature) devastate the lives of multitudes. Today's marginal image conveys complex questions about the nature of evil (theodicy). You might choose to linger for a while with today's Saint John's Bible image. What questions does it raise for you regarding the suffering and devastation in our own day? Where might you turn for comfort even if you can't find satisfying answers for all your questions?
