

THE LESSONS

First Lesson: Jeremiah 31:7-9

Lector Thus says the Lord:

Sing aloud with gladness for Jacob,

Second Lesson: Hebrews 7:23-28

Lector

The former priests were many in number, because they were prevented by death from continuing in office; but Jesus holds his priesthood permanently, because he continues forever. Consequently he is able for all time to save those who approach God through him, since he always lives to make intercession for them.

For it was fitting that we should have such a high priest, holy, blameless, undefiled, separated from sinners, and exalted above the heavens. Unlike the other high priests, he has no need to offer sacrifices day after day, first for his own sins, and then for those of the people; this he did once for all when he offered himself. For the law appoints as high priests those who are subject to weakness, but the word of the oath, which came later than the law, appoints a Son who has been made perfect forever.

Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination: "Out of the Whirlwind – Where Were You" (Job chapters 38 - 42)

Today's illumination is the first of three that Thomas Ingmire completed on the "Out of the Whirlwind" texts of Job 38–42. Prior to illuminating this biblical passage, Ingmire produced other artwork assignments for the Saint John's Bible that required him to deal directly with the question of who God is, including the "Ten Commandments" illumination of Genesis 20, the "I AM Sayings" illumination of John 6–15, and the "Messianic Predictions" illumination of Isaiah 9. The three-part "Out of the Whirlwind" illuminations attempt to visualize the Job narrative's treatment of God's answer to questions about suffering. Perhaps somewhat like Job, the reader anticipates an answer that will satisfy human reason regarding what kind of god is the God of Abraham.



As today's focal illumination portrays, God answers Job's cries for explanation not with reasoning, consolation, or interpretation, but with questions. In fact, God's questions sound like those of a prosecutor in a law court – 'Respond," "Tell me," "Where were you when" Ingmire's illumination captures the challenge of these divine demands through the "shouting capital letters" flying out of the whirlwind, overlapping, hurling in all directions, contending, unrelenting.

Job has challenged God for an explanation and God's response is "I will question you, and you shall declare to me." God evokes his own power and majesty in his response to Job. God as the Creator of all that exists, has reasons the human mind cannot fathom, and Job soon becomes thoroughly convinced of that reality through this overwhelming confrontation.

Theology sometimes employs the term "mystery" to refer to reality and truth we might affirm but do not have the capacity to adequately comprehend or articulate rationally. Many of the questions surrounding life's tragedies and inexplicable setbacks offer repeated examples of this human experience. Does Ingmire's treatment of Job's whirlwind encounter in any way help you as you reflect on life tragedies or epistemological questions that trouble you? If so, could you summarize your augmented insight in a sentence or two somewhat like Job's confession in 42:5?


