When he came to the gate of the town, a widow was there gathering sticks; he called to her and said, "Bring me a little water in a vessel, so that I may drink." As she was going to bring it, he called to her and said, "Bring me a morsel of bread in your hand." But she said, "As the Lord your God lives, I have nothing baked, only a handful of meal in a jar, and a little oil in a jug; I am now gathering a couple of sticks, so that I may go home and prepare it for myself and my son, that we may eat it, and die." Elijah said to her, "Do not be afraid; go and do as you have said; but first make me a little cake of it and bring it to me, and afterwards make something for yourself and your son. 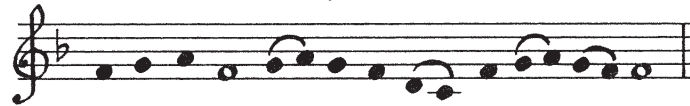
## Second Lesson: Hebrews 9:24-28

**Lector** Christ did not enter a sanctuary made by human hands, a mere copy of the true one, but he entered into heaven itself, now to appear in the presence of God on our behalf. Nor was it to offer himself again and again, as the high priest enters the Holy Place year after year with blood that is not his own; for then he would have had to suffer again and again since the foundation of the world. But as it is, he has appeared once for all at the end of the age to remove sin by the sacrifice of himself. And just as it is appointed for mortals to die once, and after that the judgment, so Christ, having been offered once to bear the sins of many, will appear a second time, not to deal with sin, but to save those who are eagerly waiting for him.

### November 17, 2024 – Pentecost 26 (B) Presiding Bishop Sean W. Rowe Investiture

Episcopalians around the world and in various time zones gathered to welcome the Most Rev. Sean Rowe as the church's 28th presiding bishop in a first-of-its-kind virtual investiture service, livestreamed Nov. 2 from the Chapel of Christ the Lord at The Episcopal Church Center in New York City.

Rowe, formerly bishop of the Episcopal Dioceses of Northwestern Pennsylvania and Western New York, was elected and confirmed as the next presiding bishop at the 81st General Convention on June 26.



Soon after his election, Bishop Rowe requested a simpler, scaled-down ceremony of Holy Eucharist and Investiture to encourage wider church engagement and reduce carbon footprint. A limited number of in-person attendees participated from inside the chapel.

The rich diversity within the multinational Episcopal Church was highlighted in several ways. A special “roll call” preceding the 11 a.m. ET ceremony featured video greetings from many of the church's 106 dioceses. Water gathered from various provinces of the church was combined in the baptismal font. The Litany for the Mission of the Church featured 15 intercessors who shared prayers in the following languages: Eastern Shoshone, Mandarin, Juba, German, Arabic, Hebrew, French, Anishinaabemowin, Spanish, English, French, and Xhosa.

The Rt. Rev. Michael Curry, who served as the church's 27th presiding bishop from 2015-2024, presided over the first half of the service, which included a land acknowledgment from the Rt. Rev. Katharine Jefferts Schori, who served as 26th presiding bishop; a welcome from diocesan and investiture committee representatives and House of Deputies President Julia Ayala Harris; the renewal of baptismal vows; and the presentation of the primatial staff. Bishop Jefferts Schori joined youth presentative Maya Lattimer in offering prayers for the new presiding bishop, whom Bishop Curry presented along with Bishop Rowe's family.

Bishop Rowe presided over the service of Holy Eucharist and delivered a sermon based on the Gospel passage of John 11:32-44. “I believe that it is in our gathered communities across our church where we come closest to glimpsing the real power of the story of Lazarus,” he said. “Every time we feed the hungry, care for the sick, and welcome the stranger, we are reaching for life in the face of death. As we baptize and bury God's people, as we make disciples and proclaim the gospel, as we soothe the suffering and shield the joyous, we are unbinding our congregations and setting our hurting world free.” Find links to the recorded service; worship service booklet; Bishop Rowe's sermon; and more at [iam.ec/investiture](http://iam.ec/investiture).

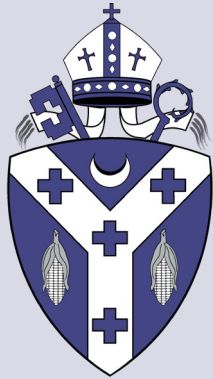


# Socks & Gloves Drive

## Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination: "Ruth, the Gleaner" (Ruth 2:2-23)

Generations of Israelites had evolved a deeply ingrained hatred of the Moabite people long before the Book of Ruth was written. Yet, amid this heritage of longstanding enmity, Ruth emerges as an advocate for inclusivity. To this end, the book highlights the fact that David, Israel's most revered King, was the grandson of a Moabite woman.

Today's illumination signals more than an overflowing basket of grain. The image of Ruth's joyously swirling skirts and lively celebratory spirit speaks to the quality of her being. Her choice to adopt Naomi's people and God as her own restores fertility and confers a future to a family lineage that otherwise would have been extinguished. The challenges of barrenness and of trusting God's promises persist as significant factors in several subsequent narratives sacred to ancient Jewish history. Immediately following the Book of Ruth is the story of Hannah, who through divine promise conceives a son who becomes Israel's stalwart prophet Samuel. Later, the story of Elizabeth and Zechariah and the birth of John the Baptist repeat the same themes. These parallel narratives convey fundamental insights into God's nature and overarching redemptive plan, which also are quietly present in the "Ruth, the Gleaner" illumination. Despite the Israelites' unfaithfulness and rebelliousness, God's messianic plan was accomplished through a singular family line that included Ruth, a despised Moabite woman.



In a world that sometimes may seem to have forgotten God, where do you continue to find seeds of divine activity? Do the locations of those seminal workings ever seem surprising to you?
