What is Kirkin' of the Tartan?

Welcome to Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral's *Kirkin' of the Tartan* service, a Cathedral annual tradition for more than 40 years. *Kirking*, from the Scottish Gaelic word *kirk*, means church. In this usage, it means "blessing."

While the Kirkin' o' the Tartan service celebrates Scotland and Scottish heritage, it is a truly a Scottish-American custom. If one searches the Internet for information, stories abound of the Kirkin's roots being in days of the Act of Proscription, when the wearing of the kilt was banned in the Highlands. According to the legend, Highlanders hid pieces of tartan and brought them to church to be secretly blessed at a particular point in the service. Ask any Scot or Scottish expatriate about the Kirkin', and chances are you will be met with a questioning look and an admission of ignorance of this supposedly centuries-old Scottish tradition.

In his famous collection of Highland folklore, prayers, charms and omens, the Carmina Gadelica, Alexander Carmichael does list a prayer for the "Consecration of the Cloth", but no mention is made of it originating from the days following the '45 or being associated with outlawed tartan. Whilst making for a rather romantic legend, there seems to be no credible source for such a tale. The real history of the Kirkin' service is "All American", with a Scottish "twist."

The Rev. Peter Marshall is believed to be the originator of the Kirkin o' the Tartan service. Rev. Marshall, originally from Coatbridge, Scotland, was the pastor of the New York Avenue Presbyterian Church in Washington DC, and served as Chaplain of the United States Senate. During the Second World War, Rev. Marshall held prayer services at New York Avenue to raise funds for British war relief. At one of the services on April 27, 1941 (although a May 1943 date is sometimes mentioned) Rev. Marshall gave a sermon entitled "the Kirkin' o' the Tartans." In 1954, the Kirkin' was moved to National Cathedral (Episcopal) in Washington. Nowadays, the celebration is found across denominational lines and is meant to reflect patriotism, faithfulness and independence. Kirkin' is typically celebrated on Tartan Day (April 6) or on St. Andrew's Day (November 30), the patron saint of Scotland. (Adapted from Todd Wilkinson as found on www.scottishtartansmuseum.org)

On this day, we also honor the debt the Episcopal Church owes to the Scottish Episcopal Church. Before and after the American Revolution, there were no Anglican bishops living in the colonies. Those seeking ordination to the priesthood could not be ordained without making an arduous round-trip journey to England. In 1784, Samuel Seabury was elected as first bishop in the American Episcopal Church. Since there were no Anglican bishops in America to consecrate him, and because he refused to pledge allegiance to the King of England, he traveled to Scotland to be consecrated by bishops there. Bishops in the Scottish Episcopal church did not swear allegiance to the crown. When Bishop Seabury returned to the States, he brought with him the Scottish Communion Rite, parts of which are still used in American Episcopal churches today. The American Episcopal church commemorates Samuel Seabury's life and ministry on November 14.





Meet Our New Bishop-elect

At the 135th Annual Convention, the Very Rev. Amy Dafler Meaux was elected as Bishop Diocesan of The Diocese of West Missouri on the first ballot!

The Very Reverend Amy Dafler Meaux has served as the Dean and Rector of Trinity Episcopal Cathedral in Little Rock, AR, since her appointment as the first female Dean in August 2020.

During her time at the Cathedral, she has led the Vestry in the creation of a Master Plan to address the needs of their historic property; facilitated a partnership between the Arkansas Hunger Relief Alliance and the Cathedral to build a community garden on an empty lot; and begun a child-centered midweek Eucharist that draws families from across the community.



Dean Meaux has served parishes in New Orleans, Dallas, and Danville, Kentucky. 

Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination: "Hannah's Prayer" (1 Samuel 1:4-20 & 2:1-10)

The Revised Common Lectionary readings for today do something interesting. The Old Testament, track 1 reading features Hannah's prayer of distress (1 Samuel 1:4-20) while one of the two text options for the Canticle accentuates her subsequent prayer of praise and gratitude (1 Samuel 2:1-10). Both texts are needed to give a complete picture of Hannah's spiritual pilgrimage during a traumatic period in her life. Furthermore, these are excellent accompanying texts for the apocalyptic messages of Daniel 12 and Mark 13. Apocalyptic literature engages the very troubling issue of an often faith-disorienting disconnect between God's goodness and life's unfathomable hard realities. Biblical apocalyptic writings imagine how this fracture someday will be made right. Hannah's prayers, while not apocalyptic in genre, do personalize the experience of living through a prolonged period of agony and distress, then receiving God's liberating promise and divine resolution.

Hannah's first prayer expresses her interminable anguish at not being able to have children, a need she feels very keenly. Given the expectations of her culture, she suffers diminished status

because of her inability to give Elkanah, her husband, an heir. Mentally imprisoned by this state of affairs, she quietly slips into the tabernacle at Shiloh empty handed and without standing and pours out her anguish in agonizing prayer.

Hannah's second prayer goes beyond gratitude to offer testimony of God's providential action in her life. Enlightened by her soul-transforming encounter with God, she declares God's lordship over her own life and also over all that exists. Through God's action she has triumphed over her troubles, been exalted, and been given status.

In today's illumination, Thomas Ingmire pairs these two prayers, both of which are heartfelt cries to God. The black panel portrays her humility and lack of power as she enters the tabernacle. It is suggestive of an extended "dark night of the soul" that has grieved her for years. The color panel is reminiscent of Mary's prayer "The Magnificat" in its rejoicing over God's gracious actions that enabled her to give birth to a son, Samuel, whom she dedicates to God's service.

Note that this illumination includes the same stamped motif found in Ruth and in many of the Gospels' illuminations. What might this suggest about apocalyptic questions concerning the cosmic order?
