Meet Our New Bishop-elect

At the 135th Annual Convention, the Very Rev. Amy Dafler Meaux was elected as Bishop Diocesan of The Diocese of West Missouri on the first ballot!

The Very Reverend Amy Dafler Meaux has served as the Dean and Rector of Trinity Episcopal Cathedral in Little Rock, AR, since her appointment as the first female Dean in August 2020.

During her time at the Cathedral, she has led the Vestry in the creation of a Master Plan to address the needs of their historic property; facilitated a partnership between the Arkansas Hunger Relief Alliance and the Cathedral to build a community garden on an empty lot; and begun a child-centered midweek Eucharist that draws families from across the community.



Dean Meaux has served parishes in New Orleans, Dallas, and Danville, Kentucky. In all of these, she has made particular effort to get to know people at every level and from every background, whether by washing dishes with sextons at Trinity Cathedral, taking Sunday supply opportunities at small rural churches as a Standing Committee member in the Diocese of Lexington, or digging into Godly Play with Jesus's youngest disciples. Dean Meaux is both a "balcony leader" who takes time to view the big picture, and someone who gets her hands dirty, meeting one on one with those who are too often forgotten.

Dean Meaux holds degrees from Louisiana Scholars' College and Seminary of the Southwest. She met her husband Jared in Louisiana. They have been married for 25 years and are the proud parents of three children. Together, they enjoy the outdoors, especially hiking and traveling. Dean Meaux is an avid knitter and loves good fiction books.

Dean Meaux is excited to witness the ways the Diocese of West Missouri is flourishing: from your missional DNA, to your desire to seek and serve your neighbors, to your commitment to relationships and the holy middle. Like the people of West Missouri, she is committed to the Gospel, loving her neighbor, and overcoming perceived barriers to building community. She hopes that, together, we can explore ministry and empower disciples across West Missouri.



November 24, 2024 – Christ the King (B) Christ the King Sunday

Today, many parishes within The Episcopal Church celebrate the Feast of Christ the King. This feast day falls on the last Sunday of the liturgical year, the Sunday before the beginning of Advent. The feast is a relative newcomer to the liturgical calendar; it was first instituted by Pope Pius XI in 1925, when he wrote the encyclical *Quas Primas*. Here, he lays out the different understandings of kingship that Jesus Christ possesses.

Pius XI also explains how Christians ought to live as a result of Christ's kingship: "He must reign in our minds, which should assent with perfect submission and firm belief to revealed truths and to the doctrines of Christ. He must reign in our wills, which should obey the laws and precepts of God. He must reign in our hearts, which should spurn natural desires and love God above all things, and cleave to him alone. He must reign in our bodies and in our members, which should serve as instruments for the interior sanctification of our souls, or to use the words of the Apostle Paul, as instruments of justice unto God." By the 1970s, the Feast of Christ the King had been more or less institutionalized throughout many Christian denominations and was fixed as occurring the last Sunday before Advent.

The lessons for this day support the understanding of Christ as sovereign. Jeremiah writes, "The days are surely coming, says the Lord, when I will raise up for David a righteous Branch, and he shall reign as king and deal wisely, and shall execute justice and righteousness in the land." The Song of Zechariah bridges the seasons beautifully as we hear the prophecy foretelling the ministry of St. John the Baptist, from whom we'll hear more very shortly. The Letter to the Colossians explains, "[The Father] has rescued us from the power of darkness and transferred us into the kingdom of his beloved Son, in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins." It is only in the Gospel reading that we see the most difficult aspect of Jesus' kingship: "The soldiers also mocked him, coming up and offering him sour wine, and saying, 'If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!' There was also an inscription over him, 'This is the King of the Jews." We remember that Jesus' kingship is not distant and remote in some capital city thousands of miles away. His kingship is not detached nor aloof. No, he reigns for now in the very hearts of the faithful, freeing us and bringing us together under his most gracious rule.

Episcopal Relief & Development is working with the Episcopal Church of Cuba to respond to Hurricane Oscar, and the mid-October power grid failure that continues to impact the entire island.



On October 18, following weeks of intermittent grid outages, ten million people lost power. On October 20, during the blackout, Hurricane Oscar made landfall, flooding and damaging the island's eastern side, and killing seven people. People in the Guantanamo and Baracoa areas had little warning that Oscar was coming because the ongoing power outages badly affected communication systems. Church leaders surveyed the impacted areas and found 82 homes had completely collapsed, 1300 had partially collapsed and over 100 families' appliances were destroyed or washed away.



Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination: "Revelation Incipit with the Son of Man" (Revelation 1:1-20)

Donald Jackson, Artistic Director of the Saint John's Bible project, was solely responsible for creation and production of the book of Revelation. He rendered all the calligraphy, illuminations, and other artistic elements of this, the project's concluding work. Based on his supervisory position and his experience and vision for this undertaking, he was able to draw on elements from the previously completed books to bring a culminating visual unity to the entire work.

With the book of Revelation, Jackson worked on all eight print spreads simultaneously, resulting in a unity of color, style, and theme that is unique within The Saint



John's Bible. The imagery is bold, using the seven colors of the spectrum as had been the case with the earlier Prophets volume. In so doing, Jackson sought to connect the visions of the book of Revelation with their root images found in Old Testament writings.

Today's focal illumination includes the elaborate Revelation book heading, incipit, and multipaneled illumination. The dominate image alludes to the Son of Man prophecy in the Old Testament book of Daniel. This portrayal makes a repeat use of the Son of Man image from the Prophets volume of The Saint John's Bible. The lampstands are reused from the "Vision of Isaiah" illumination where Isaiah envisions God on a throne surrounded by lampstands.

The artwork in Revelation intentionally portrays liturgical imagery throughout. Initially this book was intended for distribution among churches in all of Asia Minor, giving it a deliberate liturgical purpose. What liturgical elements do you detect in Revelation's artistic images?

In addition, Jackson uses the stamps from the Tree of Life image in the Wisdom Books volume (see the Sirach carpet page) and the fish motifs from the "Loaves and Fishes" illumination of Mark 6.

Finally, John's declaration that he was "in the Spirit" (Rev. 1:10) is emphasized in a marginal quotation to connect the descriptions of this vision with those of Ezekiel (e.g., "I saw something like...") indicating that this was not intended to be

understood literally but to be read as an imperfect rendering of a divine encounter that defied the adequacy of human language to convey.

The cumulative effect of Jackson's work in the book of Revelation serves as an artistic capstone which unites the visual messages of the entire preceding biblical corpus into a crowning portrayal of divine purpose and achievement.


