



December 1, 2024 – Advent 1 (C) First Week of Advent: Saying "Yes" to the Journey

As Advent begins this week, we invite you to orient yourself to the coming of Jesus at Christmas through the practices of *Journeying the Way of Love*. This journey begins by saying "yes" to God's call to birth new life into the world—a call that is both powerful and gentle, a call that will, if fully embraced, grow beyond our imaginations, spilling out of ourselves and into our family, friends, community, and the whole world. Over the course of this holy season, we invite you to respond to that call using these daily practices, and encourage you to offer them to your friends, family, and neighbors.

Sunday, December I WORSHIP

Read Luke 21:25-36. How do the symbols of the Advent season help you understand the story of Jesus? Where do you see them in your worship today?

Monday, December 2 **PRAY**

Pray along with the Collect for Advent I, found on page 211 of The Book of Common Prayer. Set a timer for three minutes to sit in silence and hear what God might be saying back to you.

Tuesday, December 3 **TURN**

Read Isaiah 58. How does this reading challenge you to think about feasts and festivals differently? How might this lesson change the way you celebrate or recognize this holy season?

Wednesday, December 4 **BLESS**

Call or write a letter to a family member with whom you would like to have a closer relationship. Make plans in the new year to chat on the phone or meet over Zoom or in person. Let them know how much you love them and look forward to knowing them better.

Thursday, December 5 **REST**

Put your phone on airplane mode and leave it in a dresser drawer for an hour or two. Whatever happens in that time, you can handle later. Give this time to yourself and Jesus, to rest and recharge for the week ahead.

Friday, December 6

Go out into your neighborhood today. Where is God at work? Ask God to show you how you can celebrate that good work and name God's presence in your community.

Saturday, December 7 **LEARN**

Read Luke 1:59-80. When Zechariah's speech returns, he praises God. If you lost the power to speak for nine months like Zechariah did, what would be your first word of praise? Share this with your family, friends, and on social media.

Please support hurricane relief efforts

Episcopal Relief & Development is working with the Episcopal Church of Cuba to respond to Hurricane Oscar, and the mid-October power grid failure that continues to impact the entire island.



On October 18, following weeks of intermittent grid outages, ten million people lost power. On October 20, during the blackout, Hurricane Oscar made landfall, flooding and damaging the island's eastern side, and killing seven people. People in the Guantanamo and Baracoa areas had little warning that Oscar was coming because the ongoing power outages badly affected communication systems. Church leaders surveyed the impacted areas and found 82 homes had completely collapsed, 1300 had partially collapsed and over 100 families' appliances were destroyed or washed away.

In response to Hurricane Oscar and the ongoing power outages, Episcopal Relief & Development is working with the Episcopal Church of Cuba to provide food, hygiene products, fans, rechargeable lamps and supplies for home repairs. Find out more at **episcopalrelief.org**.

In our Adult Formation this year we will take a journey using Forward Movement's *The Path*, an excerpted version of the Bible that covers most of the major stories chronologically. Through The Path, we will become familiar with the grand overarching narrative of the entire Bible. We will learn the story of God's extraordinary and unrelenting love for us in its many dimensions. 

Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination: "Special Text Treatment" (1 Thessalonians 4:16-18)

Ideally, the artwork from the Saint John's Bible used as our focus in this essay provides visual accompaniments (visio divina) to the liturgical texts for a given week. However, some weeks have no artwork specific to the selected lectionary texts. Today is one such occasion, so I will need to improvise a bit.

The theme drawn from today's liturgical texts is "waiting." Jeremiah 33:14-16 involves waiting for messianic fulfillment. Psalm 25:1-10 speaks of waiting for God's salvation. 1 Thessalonians 3:9-13 offers a prayer for persistence in holy living while waiting for the Lord's coming. Luke 21:25-36 exhorts the faithful to watch and stay prepared for the coming of the Son of Man. Unfortunately, the Saint John's Bible has no artwork dealing directly with any of these texts.

The closest applicable artwork seems to be a special text treatment based on 1 Thessalonians 4:16-18, which deals with the subject of waiting for Christ's Second Coming. Advent involves a complex type of waiting, a waiting that looks both backwards and forward. It involves looking backwards to Jesus' birth, the accomplishment of the inauguration of God's



redemptive promises. It also involves looking forward to the "second coming" when God completes what he has promised. We live in the interim between these actions and find ourselves waiting for their ultimate fulfillment. Three of today's lectionary readings speak of a future culmination of human history. Biblically, such waiting calls for patience and discipline.

Today's featured text treatment by Donald Jackson draws attention to the continuity of God's redemptive purpose and the encouragement we need to live as faithful followers of Christ despite the discouragement and confusing ambiguity endemic to daily life. The artwork of Saint John's Bible portrays a unifying theme woven throughout the New Testament Epistles. This theme is introduced in the illumination "Fulfillment of Creation" from Romans 8:1-39, "For the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the children of God." Selected text treatments in the Epistles that follow advance aspects of God's "fulfillment." The continuity of this purpose is announced in the stamped patterns used to accentuate these texts. Each text involves some dimension of waiting or expectancy. Today's highlighted text emphasizes the hope of "being with the Lord forever," the culminating fulfillment of creation's waiting.

What disciplines might you need to enhance while waiting on God this Advent season?
