



(in the scroll of the book it is written of me)."

He abolishes the first in order to establish the second. And it is by God's will that we have been sanctified through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all.







# Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination: "The Magnificat" Text Treatment (Luke 1:46-55)

The Magnificat (Mary's response to her cousin Elizabeth when visiting her following the Anuniciation by the angel Gabriel) is one of Christianity's oldest Advent hymns. In the Saint John's Bible the text of this hymn is highlighted in gold on a purple background as an indication of its importance and of its message of God's intentions to subvert unjust, oppressive, and abusive human behavior and systems. It is sung daily at Evening Prayer by the Benedictines at Saint John's Abbey where this illuminated version of the Bible was conceived and brought to completion.

The message of *The Magnificat* can be unsettling, especially for established systems where injustice exists. Consequently, on various occasions its public display has been prohibited. During the so-called "Dirty War" in Argentina from 1974 to 1983, for example, the mothers of disappeared children postered the main plaza in Buenos Aires with copies of *The Magnificat*. In response, the ruling military junta banned its public display. The song's message of hope for a reordered world seemed too threatening to those in power. *The Magnificat's* vision of reformed and renewed human systems characterized by love and justice is reason for it to be given such special attention in the artwork of Saint John's Bible and be sung daily by the Benedictine community.

The tradition of Chrysography (Greek for "writing in gold") extends to early Christianity. In this form of writing the text first was written in gesso before being gilded in gold leaf and burnished. Also, in ancient cultures purple frequently was the color of royalty and wealth. No greater text treatment could be rendered than gold writing on a purple background. Thus, this treatment for *The Magnificat* is intended to lift this text to the highest level of significance possible in the Saint John's Bible.

The reality of Mary's life and world was anything but hopeful. She was a peasant living under the brutality of a Roman regime. She was unmarried and pregnant in a culture that might have punished her by stoning. Yet, *The Magnificat* sings of joy, of the proud being scattered, the humble honored, the hungry fed, the rich being sent away empty handed, the powerful being brought down, and the lowly being lifted up.

Like the Benedictines of Saint John's Abbey, do your devotional practices sustain an undying hope for a world the way God intends it to be? Advent is a season for renewing hope amid the darkness, unfairness, and brutality of the world as many daily experience it.
