

THE LESSONS

First Lesson: Isaiah 43:1-7

Lector Thus says the Lord:

Second Lesson: Acts 8:14-17

Lector When the apostles at Jerusalem heard that Samaria had accepted the word of God, they sent Peter and

John to them. The two went down and prayed for them that they might receive the Holy Spirit (for as yet the Spirit had not come upon any of them; they had only been baptized in the name of the Lord

Jesus). Then Peter and John laid their hands on them, and they received the Holy Spirit.

Gospeller The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

whether he might be the Messiah, John answered all of them by saying, "I baptize you with water; but one who is more powerful than I is coming; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing fork is in his hand, to clear his threshing floor

and to gather the wheat into his granary; but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire."

Now when all the people were baptized, and when Jesus also had been baptized and was praying, the heaven was opened, and the Holy Spirit descended upon him in bodily form like a dove. And a voice

came from heaven, "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased."





Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination

Likely you have read certain biblical texts repeatedly and discovered new and richer meaning with each reading. This is a discipline of the lectio divina. Recent lectionary themes have offered the same opportunity for us to practice the visio divina. Texts surrounding the mission and ministry of John the Baptist and the inauguration of Jesus' ministry have brought us repeatedly to the Frontispiece of the Gospel of Mark illumination to pictorially contemplate multiple related gospel narratives. Today's Gospel reading from Luke focuses attention once again on the preparatory work of John the Baptist and the messianic mission of Jesus, themes visually portrayed in Donald Jackson's illumination the "Baptism of Jesus."

As with the printed texts, this illumination conveys multiple messages and emphases depending upon how we focus our view. On December 8 and 15, 2024, focus was given to the person and ministry of John the Baptist as forerunner of Jessus'

messianic work. Today, we return to the "Baptism of Jesus" illumination with a focus on the main event – the inauguration of God's redemptive work through Jesus, the Christ. The veridical action of this illumination features numerous figures: the crowds gathered along the shore of the River Jordan; several individuals in the water; and Jesus emerging from the baptismal water (almost obscured by the golden rays of divine presence surrounding him).

Yet, amid the celebration, there are ominous reminders of evil forces at work. On the left side of the illumination are red eyes peering out and two threatening spiders. These images foreshadow the wilderness temptations Jesus will confront immediately following his baptism – temptations to forfeit his life purpose by committing himself to something other than the will of his Father.



While Jackson's illumination does not engage the plethora of theological questions surrounding why Jesus chose to receive baptism by his cousin, it does portray Jesus' identification with the broken and hurting people who gathered at the Jordan River. He enters the water with them and assumes a place among them and us. Through his baptism, Jesus stands decisively with us in our anxieties and fears and joins us in our neediness. Can you imagine yourself as one of the figures portrayed in this scene?

Jesus' actions in this event receive divine blessing and empowerment through God the Father's declaration that Jesus is his "beloved son," and the descent of God the Spirit in the form of a dove. In every detail the scene conveys the meaning, mission, and message of Jesus as he steps into the public eye following years of obscurity.

Many forces in today's world try to take ownership of us and capture our allegiance. Baptism reminds us that above all else we belong to God. We are God's children. Can you name ways today's focus on Jesus' baptism inspires you to remember and renew the commitment you made to God through your baptism?
