

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Second Lesson: 1 Corinthians 12:1-11

Lector

Now concerning spiritual gifts, brothers and sisters, I do not want you to be uninformed. You know that when you were pagans, you were enticed and led astray to idols that could not speak. Therefore I want you to understand that no one speaking by the Spirit of God ever says "Let Jesus be cursed!" and no one can say "Jesus is Lord" except by the Holy Spirit.

Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone. To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good. To one is given through the Spirit the utterance of wisdom, and to another the utterance of knowledge according to the same Spirit, to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by the one Spirit, to another the working of miracles, to another prophecy, to another the discernment of spirits, to another various kinds of tongues, to another the interpretation of tongues. All these are activated by one and the same Spirit, who allots to each one individually just as the Spirit chooses.

On the third day there was a wedding in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, "They have no wine." And Jesus said to her, "Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come." His mother said to the servants, "Do whatever he tells you." Now standing there were six stone water jars for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty gallons. Jesus said to them, "Fill the jars with water." And they filled them up to the brim. He said to them, "Now draw some out, and take it to the chief steward." So they took it. When the steward tasted the water that had become wine, and did not know where it came from (though the servants who had drawn the water knew), the steward called the bridegroom and said to him, "Everyone serves the good wine first, and then the inferior wine after the guests have become drunk. But you have kept the good wine until now." Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him.

Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination

Who is Jesus? (John 2:1-11)

[Utilizing "Call of the Disciples" Illumination (John 1:35-51)]

Providing a visio divina resource from Saint John's Bible capable of helping illumine today's lectionary reading proved to be exceedingly difficult. Not only was artwork specific to these texts lacking, but also efforts to isolate an appropriate theological theme as a basis for selecting parallel artwork was equally challenging (due to scholarly disagreements over how best to interpret today's Gospel text). In the end, adopting the view that John the Evangelist employs the concept of "signs" as a way to elucidate who Jesus is in relation to the Father (as he does with the wedding at Cana narrative), helped guide the writer back to the illumination associated with John 1:35–51 (regarding John the Baptist's declaration of Jesus' identity) as a useful visual entre to today's lectionary text.

What did those who responded to the emerging identity of Jesus as "the Lamb of God" understand him to be? While the narrative of the wedding at Cana suggests some persons were becoming aware that there was something unique about Jesus, it also seems clear that they did not quite know what to make of this. Only



gradually did those who chose to follow him grow to understand his true nature and mission and their posture in relation to this. That progressive process helps connect the invitation to discipleship (John 1:35-51) with the clarifying impact of the "signs" which followed (e.g., John 2:1-11).

Today's focal illumination portrays the crowds, the sense of purpose, and the excitement associated with following Jesus. Yet, the portrayal also captures the confusion many felt over what this meant. Jesus is at the center of this rendering, but he is hard to pick out from the many other figures in the panel. He is portrayed in white, thus linking him with the angels who are hovering about, but he also blends with the people surrounding him. It is also significant that he is the same color as the lamb in the bottom right corner. The Baptist announces him as the Lamb of God, a description found only in the Gospel of John and thereby packed with symbolic and interpretative significance for this text.

At the bottom of the panel are the words of John the Baptist's declaration regarding Jesus: "Look, here is the Lamb of God". Upon hearing this, two disciples immediately decide to follow him. Their understanding of what this meant was likely incomplete, but they sensed enough to recognize that their salvation somehow resided in this person, and they acted upon that early perception.

Hidden among the mix of images in this illumination are the Passover sacrifice, elements of the Eucharist, and liturgical cloth (a piece of which protrudes beyond the border of the panel). Note the many colors and how they are used in identifying Jesus' nature, identity, and mission in these early days of his public ministry.

From previous illuminations you might recollect the calling of Samuel, Isaiah, and Elijah. How is the call to follow Jesus which is portrayed here different from those? Do you see any ways in which they might be similar? In what ways has your own understanding of who Jesus is grown over the years? Can you identify a few things that facilitated that growth for you?
