

THE LESSONS

First Lesson: Malachi 3:1-4

Lector

Thus says the Lord, See, I am sending my messenger to prepare the way before me, and the Lord whom you seek will suddenly come to his temple. The messenger of the covenant in whom you delight—indeed, he is coming, says the Lord of hosts. But who can endure the day of his coming, and who can stand when he appears?

Second Lesson: Hebrews 2:14-18

Lector

Since God's children share flesh and blood, Jesus himself likewise shared the same things, so that through death he might destroy the one who has the power of death, that is, the devil, and free those who all their lives were held in slavery by the fear of death. For it is clear that he did not come to help angels, but the descendants of Abraham. Therefore he had to become like his brothers and sisters in every respect, so that he might be a merciful and faithful high priest in the service of God, to make a sacrifice of atonement for the sins of the people. Because he himself was tested by what he suffered, he is able to help those who are being tested.

Gospeller

When the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses, the parents of Jesus brought him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord (as it is written in the law of the Lord, "Every firstborn male shall be designated as holy to the Lord"), and they offered a sacrifice according to what is stated in the law of the Lord, "a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons."

Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon; this man was righteous and devout, looking forward to the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit rested on him. It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. Guided by the Spirit, Simeon came into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him what was customary under the law, Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying,

"Master, now you are dismissing your servant in peace, according to your word; for my eyes have seen your salvation,

which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel."

And the child's father and mother were amazed at what was being said about him. Then Simeon blessed them and said to his mother Mary, "This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be opposed so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed—and a sword will pierce your own soul too."

There was also a prophet, Anna the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was of a great age, having lived with her husband seven years after her marriage, then as a widow to the age of eighty-four. She never left the temple but worshiped there with fasting and prayer night and day. At that moment she came, and began to praise God and to speak about the child to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem.

When they had finished everything required by the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favor of God was upon him.






Presider

We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination

"If I Speak in the Tongues of Mortals"

1 Corinthians 13:1-13

Today's special text treatment was the last artwork produced by Thomas Ingmire for the Saint John's Bible. It portrays a message written by the Apostle Paul to a troubled church that was being destroyed by divisions and bitter rivalries (read chapters 1 through 12 of 1 Corinthians). Ingmire's depiction captures the nature of the problem as well as the spirit for its needed solutions.

Ingmire visualizes Paul's message in two parts. In the first portion, the apostle questions the usefulness of any action or spiritual gift if it is not practiced in agape love. The physical positioning of this part of the passage appears to be out of place. Its lettering is patchy, dark,

and disjointed. It feels unharmonious and inappropriate. It seems ugly and filled with tension.

The second part of the message enumerates essential qualities of love — qualities indicative of the transforming work of Christ in the hearts of both individual believers and of the collective faith community. This section begins "Love is patient; love is kind..." and continues

to itemize the importance of love in association with each of the values listed. In conjunction with this, the text moves from solid colors to simple forms as it descends down the page, producing a rainbow effect. Consequently, the treatment not only contains some of the most graphic and eloquent text of all Paul's writings, it also conjures an enduring image of hope and of God's abiding presence, symbolized by the rainbow. Biblically, the rainbow appears after a storm offering assurance that we are not forgotten.

Ingmire's imagery implies that it is God incarnate who bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, and endures all things. Were this not the case, the

Corinthian church would have been bereft of all hope. Neither would there be hope for our world today without the abiding work of God's love. Apart from Christ's work in us we cannot love in the way Paul describes in these verses.

Thankfully, we are assured that God's love does endure. After all else in life fades away, this love abides.
