



The Lessons

First Lesson: Isaiah 6:1-13

Lector In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord sitting on a throne, high and lofty; and the hem of his robe filled the temple. Seraphs were in attendance above him; each had six wings: with two they covered their faces, and with two they covered their feet, and with two they flew. And one called to another and said:

"Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts;

the whole earth is full of his glory."

The pivots on the thresholds shook at the voices of those who called, and the house filled with smoke. And I said: "Woe is me! I am lost, for I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips; yet my eyes have seen the King, the Lord of hosts!"

Then one of the seraphs flew to me, holding a live coal that had been taken from the altar with a pair of tongs. The seraph touched my mouth with it and said: "Now that this has touched your lips, your guilt has departed and your sin is blotted out." Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" And I said, "Here am I; send me!" And he said, "Go and say to this people:

'Keep listening, but do not comprehend; keep looking, but do not understand.'
Make the mind of this people dull, and stop their ears, and shut their eyes,
so that they may not look with their eyes, and listen with their ears,
and comprehend with their minds, and turn and be healed." Then I said, "How long, O Lord?" And he said: "Until cities lie waste without inhabitant, and houses without people, and the land is utterly desolate; until the Lord sends everyone far away, and vast is the emptiness in the midst of the land. Even if a tenth part remain in it, it will be burned again, like a terebinth or an oak whose stump remains standing when it is felled." The holy seed is its stump. The Word of the Lord.

Second Lesson: 1 Corinthians 15:1-11

Lector


I would remind you, brothers and sisters, of the good news that I proclaimed to you, which you in turn received, in which also you stand, through which also you are being saved, if you hold firmly to the message that I proclaimed to you—unless you have come to believe in vain.

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For I handed on to you as of first importance what I in turn had received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures, and that he was buried, and that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers and sisters at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me. For I am the least of the apostles, unfit to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace toward me has not been in vain. On the contrary, I worked harder than any of them—though it was not I, but the grace of God that is with me. Whether then it was I or they, so we proclaim and so you have come to believe.



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




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Presider It is right, and a good and joyful thing, always and everywhere to give thanks to you, Father Almighty, Creator of heaven and earth.

Presider We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."



Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination

"Vision of Isaiah"

Isaiah 6:1-13

"Your sin is blotted out." (v. 7)

Today's focal illumination portrays the typical human response in the Bible when a person encounters God in his glory – a sense of debilitating fear, sinfulness, and unworthiness. It also depicts God's divine action in response to open and honest confession of one's condition – the admonition to "not be afraid" accompanied by cleansing from sin and quilt.

In the lower portion of this illumination, Isaiah lies utterly vulnerable and powerless (absolutely human) upheld by seraphs (he is completely dependent on divine support). In his condition he is only capable of uttering, "Woe is me ... I am a man of unclean lips ... I have seen the Lord of hosts!" To

ancient Hebrews an encounter of this nature meant death, for no one was able to see God directly and live (Exodus 33:20). Note in today's depiction that God is symbolically portrayed (through the use of gold) in the temple attended by seraphim. This portrayal combines the temple and royal court through such images as the three arches and ten lampstands, together with fragments of a palace wall. The color purple dominates the scene as an indication of royalty. Scattered pieces of red cloth are suggestive of the "hem of the divine garment" which Isaiah describes as filling the temple. The throne consists of a golden box which extends upward to frame the head and shoulders of a human figure (the king). In this vision Isaiah is experiencing the in-breaking of the divine into human history, a reality further emphasized by the blocks of rainbow color derived from Ezekiel 1:28 as indicators of God's glory.



Overwhelmed, Isaiah is surprised to experience new life through this encounter instead of the condemnation he seems to have anticipated. He finds himself cleansed of his sin of unclean speech by a red hot coal taken from the altar by a seraph and touched to his lips. He is declared free of guilt and sin. Consequently, he feels himself capable of accepting God's invitation to be the deliverer of a divine message of judgment to a spiritually deaf, blind, and undiscerning people.

The lesson imparted to us through this illumination is that our human weakness and sinfulness are not impossible barriers to God's love. Like Isaiah, no person is without failings. Therefore, it is by recognizing and acknowledging our brokenness rather than by denying and hiding it that we are rendered usable by God. Also, like Isaiah, it is when we turn to God in honest selfawareness that we become capable of agreeing to do what otherwise would seem impossible — to sincerely volunteer: "Here am I, send me."
