


Second Lesson: 1 Corinthians 15:12-20

Lector

Now if Christ is proclaimed as raised from the dead, how can some of you say there is no resurrection of the dead? If there is no resurrection of the dead, then Christ has not been raised; and if Christ has not been raised, then our proclamation has been in vain and your faith has been in vain. We are even found to be misrepresenting God, because we testified of God that he raised Christ-whom he did not raise if it is true that the dead are not raised. For if the dead are not raised, then Christ has not been raised. If Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins. Then those also who have died in Christ have perished. If for this life only we have hoped in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied.

But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have died.

Outreach Volunteer Opportunities

The Emergency Food Assistance Program

In partnership with St. Paul's on Main, we have been invited to help organize and distribute food as part of TEFAP (The Emergency Food Assistance Program). We meet from about 9:30 a.m. to noon.

St. Paul's receives delivery of several pallets of shelf-stable and frozen food from Harvesters each month. Friendly volunteers are needed to break down the pallets and repackage the food into family-sized boxes and bags. Then we open the doors to those in need and start handing out the food.

Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination

"Two Ways of Living" (Luke 6:17-26)

[Utilizing the "Beatitudes" Illumination from Matthew 5]

In Luke's narrative, Jesus had chosen his twelve Apostles viewed from a descending perspective but progress just prior to delivering the body of teachings often titled "The Sermon on the Mount" (Matthew's account) or "The Sermon on the Plains" (Luke's account) of which the Beatitudes constitute one section. In Luke's version, emphasis is given to a view of God's kingdom that stands in stark contrast to our society's usual way of thinking about values and priorities. In doing this, lesus informs his would-be disciples of what following him truly involves. God's blessings accrue to the poor, hungry, sad, and expendable while woe is announced for the rich, full, happy, and popular. Biblical exegetes

have struggled for centuries over how to correctly interpret and apply these teachings to everyday Christian living. Most agree that the truth of these teachings does not reside with wallowing in guilt, romanticizing poverty, and avoiding happiness, but disagreements over exactly what they do teach make efforts to visually portray the Beatitudes enormously challenging.

Saint John's Bible Committee on Illumination and Text (CIT) chose to illumine the Matthew 5 version of the Beatitudes rather than the Luke 6 version. Consequently, focus is placed on their application to the Christian's spiritual life in contrast to the physical realm of concern. Matthew speaks of the "poor in spirit" and "those who hunger and thirst after righteousness" whereas Luke writes of God's favor resting on the most wretched, grieving, starving, and destitute of persons.

The "Beatitudes" was Thomas Inqmire's first illumination for the Saint John's Bible project. Later, he also did the "Ten Commandments" illumination for Exodus 20. Frequently parallels are made between Moses' ascending Mount Sinai to receive the Law and Matthew's depiction of Jesus "going up the mountain" to deliver a new rendering of God's law. In the "Ten Commandments" illumination, notice how the words shift from orderly and coherent to fragmented and incomprehensible when

from fragmented to coherent when approached from an ascending perspective. In the "Beatitudes" illumination, note what happens with the word "blessed" as you shift perspectives on the page.

What parallels do you see between these two illuminations? Do you detect any differences between them? In Matthew 5:17 Jesus declares that he came to fulfill the Old Testament law, not abolish it. In what ways do the "Ten Commandments" and the "Beatitudes" illuminations convey this relationship?





The Absalom Jones Fund

People of all backgrounds and faiths are invited to give generously to the Absalom Jones Fund in support of the work of two historically Black institutions of higher education in cultivating and preparing leaders: Voorhees University and Saint Augustine's University.

Many Episcopal congregations take dedicated offerings around Feb. 13 in observance of the Feast Day of Absalom Jones, the first Black priest ordained by the church.

Jones' witness to the way of Jesus included efforts to abolish slavery and to lift up all those cast down. He understood that education is the key to empowerment. "Absalom Jones recognized the transformative power of education," Bishop Michael Curry writes in a churchwide letter inviting donations. "These institutions continue his mission, providing a liberal arts education and robust campus ministries that shape young adults into ethical leaders."

Both Saint Augustine's University in Raleigh, North Carolina, and Voorhees University in Denmark, South Carolina, were founded after the Civil War to create educational opportunities for formerly enslaved people.

"The chaplains at Voorhees and Saint Augustine's play a crucial role in this formation, guiding students in their faith journey and helping them navigate the complexities of our world," Curry writes.

Donations to the historically Black colleges and universities (HBCUs) help support "the vital work of these chaplains" he says. "By investing in these students, we are investing in a future where love, justice, and reconciliation prevail."

Voorhees University and Saint Augustine's provide an excellent liberal arts education to thousands of students, the majority of whom come from low-income households, and over 40% of whom are the first in their families to attend a four-year college. The Gospel work of education and emancipation, evangelism and formation, reconciliation and commitment to a just and humane society and world is happening at these schools!
