

THE LESSONS

First Lesson: Genesis 45:3-11, 15

Lector Joseph said to his brothers, "I am Joseph. Is my father still alive?" But his brothers could not answer

him, so dismayed were they at his presence.

Then Joseph said to his brothers, "Come closer to me." And they came closer. He said, "I am your brother, Joseph, whom you sold into Egypt. And now do not be distressed, or angry with yourselves, because you sold me here; for God sent me before you to preserve life. For the famine has been in the land these two years; and there are five more years in which there will be neither plowing nor harvest. God sent me before you to preserve for you a remnant on earth, and to keep alive for you many survivors. So it was not you who sent me here, but God; he has made me a father to Pharaoh, and lord of all his house and ruler over all the land of Egypt. Hurry and go up to my father and say to him, 'Thus says your son Joseph, God has made me lord of all Egypt; come down to me, do not delay. You shall settle in the land of Goshen, and you shall be near me, you and your children and your children's children, as well as your flocks, your herds, and all that you have. I will provide for you there—since there are five more years of famine to come—so that you and your household, and all that you have, will not come to poverty."

And he kissed all his brothers and wept upon them; and after that his brothers talked with him.

Second Lesson: 1 Corinthians 15:35-38,42-50

Lector

Someone will ask, "How are the dead raised? With what kind of body do they come?" Fool! What you sow does not come to life unless it dies. And as for what you sow, you do not sow the body that is to be, but a bare seed, perhaps of wheat or of some other grain. But God gives it a body as he has chosen, and to each kind of seed its own body.

So it is with the resurrection of the dead. What is sown is perishable, what is raised is imperishable. It is sown in dishonor, it is raised in glory. It is sown in weakness, it is raised in power. It is sown a physical body, it is raised a spiritual body. If there is a physical body, there is also a spiritual body. Thus it is written, "The first man, Adam, became a living being"; the last Adam became a life-giving spirit. But it is not the spiritual that is first, but the physical, and then the spiritual. The first man was from the earth, a man of dust; the second man is from heaven. As was the man of dust, so are those who are of the dust; and as is the man of heaven, so are those who are of heaven. Just as we have borne the image of the man of dust, we will also bear the image of the man of heaven.


What I am saying, brothers and sisters, is this: flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God, nor does the perishable inherit the imperishable.

Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination

God's Power to Transform

"At the Last Trumpet" Illumination 1 Corinthians 15:50-58

Appropriately applied, the visio divina can be practiced in ways that offer added insight into multiple biblical texts. The Revised Common Lectionary is especially helpful for this exercise since the chosen texts provide varying perspectives and historical contexts addressing a selected theological theme. Today's liturgical texts offer an excellent opportunity to demonstrate this.

Only one of today's lectionary texts includes an associated illumination – 1 Corinthians 15. It highlights God's promise of transformation, a reality either demonstrated or encouraged in the accompanying Old Testament, Psalm, and Gospel texts. But the illumination can be applied fruitfully to these other texts as well.

The "At the Last Trumpet" illumination symbolically portrays a gathering and transformation of the faithful who have died in Christ. Illuminator Hazel Dolby here employs a technique she had used earlier in the "Square before the Watergate" illumination in Nehemiah – the use of geometric patterning to suggest the action of uniting scattered persons and transforming them into a new community. Paul's words concerning the sting of death from the previous page are transposed into the illumination with the message "We will all be changed" superimposed over them. This expresses the believer's ultimate transformation from death into God's cohesive and united community which is held together by Christ's light (signified by the lines of gold scattered amid the soft patterning in the upper half of the panel).

The illumination's message of God's transforming work also is conveyed through the Joseph narrative in Genesis chapters 37


through 50. In this narrative, a family is torn apart by sibling rivalries ending in slavery, exile, guilt-ladened consciences, and great suffering. Joseph, however, discovers a providential purpose in all of this that, gradually, transforms himself and later his entire family into a "people of God" who become agents of God's revelation to all humanity. Can you imagine how Dolby's illumination might be applied to this narrative? How does associating the 1 Corinthians 15 text with the Genesis 45 text via Dolby's illumination expand your insight into the Biblical message regarding transformation?

Jesus' admonitions in the Luke 6 text regarding forgiveness add another dimension to the message "we will be changed." He proclaims that radical forgiveness can heal complex,

painful, and egregious wrongs, thereby transforming the people and societies suffering under such malignancies. How might the geometric images in the illumination be applied to forgiven individuals, groups, occurrences, and contexts to produced transformed communities? What happens when you succeed in genuinely forgiving someone or some malady? In what ways might such forgiveness be transforming?

Finally, Psalm 37 offers an opportunity for the faithful to explore ways in which patience and trust in God can transform them into the individuals and communities God intends them to be while they continue to live in contexts characterized by maliciousness and other types of evil. What would be necessary to make transformation of this sort even possible?

You might find it helpful to spend time reflecting on ways Dolby's illumination inspires new spiritual insight for you when further applied to other biblical texts.

It is the season to probe sources of bondage and diminishment: What feels like death just now? What is holding us back from fullness of life in Christ? Our renewing of baptism entails searching self-examination and repentance. We must undergo a death to sin and all forms of resistance to God." -Julia Gatta


Mardi Gras Dinner
