

THE LESSONS

First Lesson: Deuteronomy 26:1-11

Lector

When you have come into the land that the Lord your God is giving you as an inheritance to possess, and you possess it, and settle in it, you shall take some of the first of all the fruit of the ground, which you harvest from the land that the Lord your God is giving you, and you shall put it in a basket and go to the place that the Lord your God will choose as a dwelling for his name. You shall go to the priest who is in office at that time, and say to him, "Today I declare to the Lord your God that I have come into the land that the Lord swore to our ancestors to give us." When the priest takes the basket from your hand and sets it down before the altar of the Lord your God, you shall make this response before the Lord your God: "A wandering Aramean was my ancestor; he went down into Egypt and lived there as an alien, few in number, and there he became a great nation, mighty and populous. When the Egyptians treated us harshly and afflicted us, by imposing hard labor on us, we cried to the Lord, the God of our ancestors; the Lord heard our voice and saw our affliction, our toil, and our oppression. The Lord brought us out of Egypt with a mighty hand and an outstretched arm, with a terrifying display of power, and with signs and wonders; and he brought us into this place and gave us this land, a land flowing with milk and honey. So now I bring the first of the fruit of the ground that you, O Lord, have given me." You shall set it down before the Lord your God and bow down before the Lord your God. Then you, together with the Levites and the aliens who reside among you, shall celebrate with all the bounty that the Lord your God has given to you and to your house.

I will protect him, because he knows my Name.

He shall call upon me, and I will answer him; *

I am with him in trouble; I will rescue him and bring him to honor.

With long life will I satisfy him, *

and show him my salvation.

Second Lesson: Romans 10:8b-13

Lector "The word is near you,

on your lips and in your heart"

(that is, the word of faith that we proclaim); because if you confess with your lips that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. For one believes with the heart and so is justified, and one confesses with the mouth and so is saved. The scripture says, "No one who believes in him will be put to shame." For there is no distinction between Jew and Greek; the same Lord is Lord of all and is generous to all who call on him. For, "Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved."





Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.





Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination

First Sunday of Lent, Jesus' Temptation (Luke 4:1-13)

Utilizing the "Baptism of Jesus" Illumination (Mark Frontispiece)

The illuminations in Saint John's Bible often unite multiple biblical lessons into a single depiction. This is certainly the case with the "Baptism of Jesus" illumination. During Advent, focus was placed on the image of John the Baptist and the illumination's portrayal of his role as the forerunner of the Messiah. Then, during the season of Epiphany, emphasis was given to the illumination's message concerning Jesus' baptism and its role in the inauguration of his earthly ministry. Now, during Lent, we once again return to the same illumination, this time concentrating upon a portion of the panel that portends the temptations awaiting Jesus immediately following his baptism. Thus, this illumination constitutes a complex visual depiction which connects multiple scriptural narratives into a more comprehensive theological overview.

Notice that just above the horizon on the left side of the panel are several pairs of red eyes, two large arachnids, and several shadowy entities (possibly

implying spiritual forces of darkness) intimating danger which is hidden alongside the amazing divine activity that is being unveiled. According to the gospel text, following his baptism, lesus immediately headed into the desert where he was tempted. The Saint John's Bible does not include artwork portraying the nature of these temptations but hosts of commentators over the centuries have suggested that they symbolize seductions that we all face during the course of life. First, there is the temptation to be relevant (turning a stone into bread), which might include being driven to

control and be efficient. It involves the achievement of an outcome regardless of its costs, its consequences, or who might get destroyed in the process. Second, comes the temptation to do something spectacular (jumping from the pinnacle of the temple) as a means to attract attention, win followers, and gain influence. Finally, there is the temptation to power (gaining authority over all the kingdoms of the world) a human drive for domination over people and things which is a mode of being that stands in stark contrast to the Christ who "did not cling to his divine power but emptied himself and became as we are."

In this illumination we are taught that being a disciple of Christ is not likely to engender a life of ease. Hidden among the amazing wonders of God's actions (which may be attractive to us) are the often-unseen forces of temptation and evil at work seeking ways to thwart and overturn the workings of God (forces which may challenge us should we choose the way of discipleship).

This illumination's attention to Jesus' humanity is intended to assure us that God knows our fragile human condition under these circumstances. God is close to us even during periods of temptation in part because he has been where we are. God accepts us in our frailties and forgives us when we sincerely confess and repent of sin. Because of God's work through Christ ("he was tested in every way as we are"), we can live in hope.

Note that in the sky above the head of John the Baptist is an image of the arches of the Cathedral of Santiago de Compostela. What might the image of this renowned pilgrimage center suggest about the nature and purpose of Lent? How does it fit into the message portrayed by this illumination?
