



THE LESSONS

First Lesson: Genesis 15:1-12,17-18

Lector

The word of the Lord came to Abram in a vision, "Do not be afraid, Abram, I am your shield; your reward shall be very great." But Abram said, "O Lord God, what will you give me, for I continue childless, and the heir of my house is Eliezer of Damascus?" And Abram said, "You have given me no offspring, and so a slave born in my house is to be my heir." But the word of the Lord came to him, "This man shall not be your heir; no one but your very own issue shall be your heir." He brought him outside and said, "Look toward heaven and count the stars, if you are able to count them." Then he said to him, "So shall your descendants be." And he believed the Lord; and the Lord reckoned it to him as righteousness.

Then he said to him, "I am the Lord who brought you from Ur of the Chaldeans, to give you this land to possess." But he said, "O Lord God, how am I to know that I shall possess it?" He said to him, "Bring me a heifer three years old, a female goat three years old, a ram three years old, a turtledove, and a young pigeon." He brought him all these and cut them in two, laying each half over against the other; but he did not cut the birds in two. And when birds of prey came down on the carcasses, Abram drove them away.

As the sun was going down, a deep sleep fell upon Abram, and a deep and terrifying darkness descended upon him.

When the sun had gone down and it was dark, a smoking fire pot and a flaming torch passed between these pieces. On that day the Lord made a covenant with Abram, saying, "To your descendants I give this land, from the river of Egypt to the great river, the river Euphrates."

But our citizenship is in heaven, and it is from there that we are expecting a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ. He will transform the body of our humiliation that it may be conformed to the body of his glory, by the power that also enables him to make all things subject to himself. Therefore, my brothers and sisters, whom I love and long for, my joy and crown, stand firm in the Lord in this way, my beloved.







Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination

Second Sunday of Lent — Trusting God

"Abraham and Sarah" Illumination (Genesis 15:1-18)

The Revised Common Lectionary texts this week emphasize themes of faith, trust, and divine protection, qualities epitomized by Abraham and Sarah as recorded in Genesis 15 and elsewhere in the Bible (especially Hebrews 11). God's covenant with Abraham is central to both the lewish and Christian traditions and is the focus of the of the "Abraham and Sarah" illumination of Genesis chapters 15 through 17.





Obviously, the dominant image of this illumination is the menorah (a seven-branched candlestick or oil lamp used in Jewish worship). This symbol of faith and devotion appears in other artwork of Saint John's Bible, most prominently in the frontispiece of Matthew's Gospel. In Genesis it is featured as a family tree, a version of the tree of life in the Garden of Eden. The delicate gold filigree images (reminiscent of arabesques or mandalas) are also reused in other illuminations (e.g., Jesus' birth in Luke's frontispiece, the loaves and fishes in Mark, and "to the ends of the earth" in Acts 28). This is done to show unity and interconnectedness among the books of the Bible.

The "Abraham and Sarah" illumination is grounded upon their two names and via the menorah images rises into the sky where the names of the twelve sons of Jacob (Israel's twelve tribes) are featured. This artistic device draws attention to God's promise to Abraham, a promise

highlighted in the left margin of the illumination: "look to the heavens & count the stars, so shall your descendants be."

Note also that the names of these family members are written in Hebrew. Furthermore, the title of the book, "Genesis" is given in English on the lefthand page and in Hebrew on the righthand page. This is done to acknowledge that the book was originally a Hebrew text and a core part of the Jewish scriptures. Later in the Old Testament, books are found that originated in Greek and eventually were included in the Christian biblical canon. This is indicated by including their Greek names in the margins (e.g., Wisdom of Solomon, Sirach, and Maccabees).

What does the foliage on the menorahs in this illumination suggest? Why is the image of a sacrificial lamb included in this depiction (see the left side of the panel)? What else do you see in this illumination that is emphasized in the Genesis story?
