

Hard at Work

Schools are getting ready to begin, we're starting to fall back into our routines, and the Chiefs are back in training camp gearing up for the new season! We might even be so lucky as to see some October baseball in KC, but let's not get ahead of ourselves. I promise there will be events at the Cathedral all late summer and fall.

Events have already begun as our Summer Music Series is underway, taking place in the Nave at 2 p.m. on Sundays in August. The last Sunday, August 25, will be at the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception, also at 2 p.m.. Our final summer Parish Breakfast will be this Sunday, August 11, at 9 a.m. in Founders' Hall.

September will be very busy as we not only have our regular Cathedral events, we also get our first chance to meet the nominees for the next Bishop of West Missouri. Sunday, September 8 will be our Ministry Fair and the start of our Children/ Youth/and Adult Formation classes. Please be sure to read in this edition of *The Angelus* more about formation from Clare and Fr. James. Our annual Cathedral Cup Croquet Tournament returns on Saturday, September 14. Sign up will be available for teams of two, or you are welcome to just come watch and cheer everyone on. Sunday, September 15, at 5 p.m., is the return of our monthly Choral Evensong. Thursday, September 19, is a time to meet the Bishop nominees at the Cathedral and get a chance to hear them speak to their hope for our Diocese. There will be a light dinner at 6 p.m. and the program begins at 7 p.m., all in Founders' Hall. The Youth of the diocese will also have a chance to meet separately with the nominees at 5 p.m. You will see the full schedule of the nominees' tour in the diocese elsewhere in this edition. If you are unable to attend the program at the Cathedral, please consider attending one of the other programs in either Lee's Summit or Parkville. This is an important opportunity to get to know the nominees better and share your thoughts with our voting delegates. The election will take place at our Diocesan Convention on Saturday, November 9. On Friday, September 20, we will have the return of "For Pete's Sake," a fundraising event for Pete's Garden.

Also in September, our teaching series with the William Jewell Center for Faith and Culture resumes with two offerings: Dr. Gary Armstrong with "Personhood" and Fr. James with "Heaven and Earth: Biblical Cosmology and the Human Being." Classes will again be on Wednesday evenings from 6:30-7:45 p.m. Dr. Armstrong's class will meet September 18, 25, Oct. 2, 9. Fr. James' class will meet October 23, 30, Nov. 6, 13. Remember to register for these classes on the Center for Faith and Culture website, using code word GRACE. Dean Andy and Dr. Vernon Howard will teach classes in the Spring Semester.

October will also be busy with our Annual Blessing of the Animals on Saturday, October 5, and our Hymn Sing on Sunday, October 6. Fr. James, Deacon Barbara, and I will attend the Diocesan Clergy Retreat at Conception Abbey, Evensong will be on October 20, and our Fall Festival will be Sunday, October 27.

A lot is happening this fall, and your Cathedral staff is hard at work making sure everything goes well. Thank you to all who help make this place run, and to all of you for supporting the work and ministry of Grace and Holy Trinity.

Associate's Update



Our Family Stories

Our culture is filled with references to the Bible. From turns of phrase to art, books and movies the stories and images of the Bible are everywhere. In the U.S., 88 percent of households own at least one Bible and the average household owns four. And yet, despite this availability, the Bible can be an intimidating read. Many have opened it to the first page intending to read it "cover to cover" only to find themselves quickly bogged down by genealogies and stories with strange conclusions.

We may know some of the highlights and big events, especially if we attend church regularly. But how many of us feel comfortable opening its gilded-edge pages and navigating its books and chapters? It turns out the Bible is not a simple and straightforward book with only a single obvious meaning. Rather, it is a collection of various genres written in different geographical locations and across a great expanse of time. It is both literature and scripture. It was written by people thousands of years ago but also the inspired word of God. As Christians, it is our holy text, the revelation of God in Jesus Christ, and it is our family stories. And just like all families, those stories sometimes involve people of heroic faith and sometimes involve spectacular failures.

So I invite you to become more familiar with these stories that have been handed down to you. In our Adult Formation this year we will

take a journey through these stories using Forward Movement's The Path, an excerpted version of the Bible that covers most of the major stories chronologically. Through The Path, we will become familiar with the grand overarching narrative of the entire Bible. We will learn the story of

God's extraordinary and unrelenting love for us in its many dimensions. Copies of The Path will be available in the bookstore if you would like to own a personal copy and each chapter will be printed out weekly and made available so that everyone can follow along.



A Beautiful Year Ahead

Over the last few months, youth have had the opportunity to attend Mega Camp, Happening #98 (Diocese of Kansas), and the 81st General Convention and see not only how resolutions are crafted and voted on, but also see the election of the newest Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church. This summer has been a very busy one that will surely lead to flourishing for this upcoming fall's children, youth and college ministry schedule.

Several kids from Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral attended Mega Camp, (an Episcopal summer camp that is held the first week in June at Camp Wood in Elmdale, Kansas) this summer. While they were there, they had the opportunity to engage in small groups discussing spiritual and life topics relevant to the youth experience in today's world, they participated in traditional camp activities such as boating, archery, horseback riding, court sports and so much more. In addition to experiencing faith, and fellowship, they also developed leadership skills. Youth mentored and supported elementary age school children in having the best camp experience possible. One of our youth from the Cathedral even got a card from a younger camper thanking them for being an encouraging support for them while they were trying to score points at one of the carnival games.

Additionally, they were given the opportunity to be part of the Diocese of Kansas' Happening #98 spiritual

retreat. Happening "is a Christian experience presented by teenagers, for teenagers with the help of clergy and lay adult leadership" (Happening National). Because of the design of Happening, each youth that is on staff or leadership, must go through Happening as a participant. This summer, one of our youth from Grace and Holy participated in the Diocese of Kansas' Happening #98 so that he could be on staff for the Happening that will occur in West Missouri in September. To say that I am proud of this youth stepping up and wanting to be a peer mentor for other youth in the diocese of West Missouri is an understatement. This will take place during Cathedral Kids. In November, we are trying something new and having an Open House Godly Play formation hour. This will be a time when families will be invited to hear a Godly Play story and learn more about their children's faith formation experience. Check back on the confirmed date for this event. This will be a wonderful opportunity to invite and introduce friends and families that are looking for a new church home to experience Grace and Holy Trinity's children's ministry department. Shelter KC is helping Kansas City's homeless men and women experience freedom from the past and hope for the future. Established in 1950, their mission is to serve people in need. Shelter KC provides a place for families to cook, eat, sleep and raise their children protecting them from extreme temperatures and storms.





Outreach provided a pizza dinner for the women and children at Sheffield Place Sunday, July 28. Sheffield Place has assisted more than 1600 families in making the difficult journey from homelessness to self-sufficiency. The children were given play dough, coloring books and crayons.



Do you know it takes nearly 30 volunteers every Sunday to fill the volunteer positions we have in the combined 8 a.m., 10:30 a.m. and 5 p.m. worship services? That number does not include the choir or Holy Hands. Many of our volunteers sign up for once a month; for example: every third Sunday. Some sign up for additional special services, i.e. ordinations, funerals, special services during Holy Week and Christmas. Others make themselves available as a substitute. Others serve more than once during a month, especially when there is a fifth Sunday in the month.

As Volunteer Coordinator, I schedule the volunteers we have into the 30 spots we have each Sunday. Before scheduling anyone, I ask the volunteers to share any dates they may not be available. I want to work

around your schedule. Of course, life is unpredictable and sometimes something comes up at the last minute that prevents a volunteer from participating. That's when having subs and enough volunteers for the different jobs is vital.

Have you thought about sharing your time and talent with the church as a volunteer during worship services? I'd love to talk to you more about that. We will have a Ministry Fair in Founders Hall on September 8 and I'll have a set up with Volunteers on a poster. You may discover what types of volunteer options you might be interested in. In addition, I will have a Cathedral Connections table set up at Coffee Hour with pamphlets that list all the ways you can deepen your connection to the Cathedral by volunteering. There will be a Cathedral

Connecctions table at Coffee Hour every fourth Sunday, as well. We need volunteers in all ministries.

Thank you to the many faithful volunteers that help make our three worship services each Sunday a meaningful experience. Our church is blessed by the helpers in our parish who make it possible to provide the worship services we love.

On Saturday, September 28, we invite these very important volunteers to a brunch; to gather all of them in one place for fellowship and recognition of the importance of their dedication and support. A token of our thanksgiving for all they do. More details will follow with a formal invitation.

Clergy Discretionary Fund

As we begin another school year with all the costs associated with returning to school, we are reminded of the needs of others. The Clergy Discretionary Fund is used by the Cathedral's clergy to help those in need, both parishioners and community members. It is funded from the Operating Fund and gifts from parishioners.

Over the past year, the Clergy Discretionary Fund has assisted numerous individuals and families.

- Bought a new tire for a gentleman with four children and only one car.
- Covered the rent for several

individuals who due to medical conditions or other emergencies had to choose between food or rent. One gentleman in particular was disabled who has been waiting for his Social Security disability to be approved for a year.

- Paid for asthma medication for a mother and daughter who depend on the kindness of others for use of their cell phone, because they can't afford one themselves.
- Assisted with utilities for several individuals who, despite all efforts, cannot get caught up.

The need is always greater than the funds available.
